Your Son, Scouting, and You "Scouting...An Aide To Parents"

As a parent, you want your son to grow up to be a self-reliant, dependable and caring individual. Scouting has these same goals in mind for him. Since 1910 we have been weaving lifetime values into fun and educational activities designed to assist parents in strengthening character, good citizenship, and physical fitness in youth. Scouting teaches family values...However, we know that boys do not join Scouting to get their character built! Boys join because it is fun!



SCOUTING IS FUN WITH A PURPOSE!

HOW TO START...BASIC NEEDS FOR NEW CUB SCOUTS

Contrary to what your son may tell you, the first thing he will need to get started is not a uniform, but a book. The books in Cub Scouting are related to his age. A first-grader will need the Tiger Cub Book, a second-grader will need a Wolf Book, a third-grader needs a Bear Book, and a fourth or fifth grader will need the Webelos Book. These books contain the basics he will need for the coming year, especially the requirements for that particular advancement award.

Don't get the idea that uniforms aren't important, they are. After going through your son's book with him you'll probably have a good idea how serious a Cub Scout he will be. The uniform is an important part of the program and it represents an investment on your part. Our uniforms are of very high quality and, in most cases, will last for several years. So, be sure to buy one large enough for him to grow into.

If you can find an 'experienced' uniform in good shape, be sure to get it. Many of these 'experienced' uniforms will be just like new and will be all he needs at a very low cost.

Most new Cub Scouts will have to buy a uniform and the Council Scout Shop is the official distributor of BSA uniforms and equipment. The Scout Shop is located in the Council Service Center at 2860 Genesee Street, Cheektowaga, NY.

Cub Scouts don't require much more than this, but later on Boy Scouts will need to acquire personal camping gear for their many outings. The boys are encouraged to wear their uniforms to school on the day of their Scouting meetings. The Cub Scouts especially enjoy this, and the uniform serves as school clothing one day a week.


Note - uniforms and *Boys' Life* are not required (but recommended).

Please check with your pack to see what your pack recommends and also remember that uniforms can be purchased at thrift shops and many packs have a uniform exchange program. Check with pack leaders regarding financial assistance if needed. Some Pack's dues include a book or uniform.

TIGER CUB PROGRAM

First Grade

- I. Tiger Cubs is a one-on-one program for boys and adults.
- II. Each boy/adult team is a member of a Tiger Cub Den which:
 - A. Has five to nine boy/adult teams.
 - B. Meets 2 times each month in den meetings.
 - C. Has one outing a month called a "Go See It."
- III. Each den has a Tiger Cub Den Leader. (usually a parent)
 - A. A Tiger Cub Den Leader helps coordinate the Tiger Cub Den Meetings
 - B. Each boy/adult team takes a turn at shared leadership running the activities and working with the Tiger Cub Den Leader.



CUB SCOUT/WEBELOS SCOUT PROGRAM

Second Through Fifth Grade

I. Your boy is a member of a Den which:

- A. Has five to nine boys.
- B. Meets once a week. Regularly scheduled at the leader's convenience.
- C. Is led by a Den Leader (usually a parent), who is assisted by an assistant Den Leader, and often a Den Chief (an older Boy Scout), and a Denner (a Cub Scout elected by Den members).
- D. Includes games, crafts, skits, songs, ceremonies and periodic field trips.

THE CUB SCOUT PACK

First Through Fifth Grade

I. Your boy is a member of a Pack which:


- A. Is made up of one or more dens.
- B. Meets once a month at the Pack meeting - all Tiger Cub and Cub Scout families are expected to participate.
 - ✓ The Pack meeting is led by the Cubmaster.
 - ✓ The Pack meeting is the climax of the month's den meetings and activities.
 - ✓ Pack meetings follow a suggested theme that have games, skits, songs, ceremonies, and presentations of badges that boys earned that month.

II. Our Pack is run by the Pack Committee

- A. Made up of Den Leaders, Pack leaders, the Pack trainer, and parents.
- B. The committee meets once a month or more often if needed.
- C. Led by the Committee Chairman.
- D. The committee selects leadership, finds meeting places, performs record keeping, manages Pack finances, orders badges, maintains Pack equipment, helps train leaders, recognizes leaders, and plans activities.

III. Our Pack is owned by a Chartered Organization

- A. Chartered Organizations include parent-school organizations, religious organizations, service clubs, and other organizations interested in youth.
- B. Our Chartered Organization approves leadership, helps secure a meeting place and keeps the Pack within both their guidelines and policies and those of the BSA.
- C. Our Chartered Organization selects a Chartered Organization Representative (a liaison between our Pack and our Chartered Organization).



CUB SCOUT MOTTO

DO YOUR BEST

In a society where your son is often taught that winning is everything, Cub Scouting teaches him to "do his best" and be helpful to others as expressed in the Cub Scout Promise.

Cub Scouting is a home and neighborhood-centered program designed to support family life for boys in second through fifth grades. Each Cub Scout learns to respect his home, country, God, and other people. The program also helps boys this age to:

- Learn new physical skills through sports, crafts, and games.
- Learn how to get along with others through group activities.
- Reinforce mental skills such as writing and calculating.
- Develop personal independence.

A Cub Scout den provides your son with a group of boys his own age in which he can earn awards and recognition. In the den, he will also gain a sense of personal achievement for the new skills he learns.

THE ADVANCEMENT PLAN

The responsibility of a boy's advancement in Cub Scouting lies with the family and not with the den or pack. Some advancement requirements are done at den meetings but most are done at home with the family.

BOBCAT

All boys earn the Bobcat badge first, by learning the Cub Scout Promise, Law of the Pack, handshake, salute, sign, motto, and the meaning of "*Webelos*." After receiving the Bobcat badge, the boys work on requirements based on their grade level.



TIGER CUBS


The Tiger Cub badge is earned after completing five achievements grouped in three areas: den activity, family activity, and Go See It. After completing the Tiger Cub rank, boys may earn one Tiger Track bead when he completes 10 electives. There is no limit to the number of Tiger Cub beads a boy can earn. Advancements are displayed on a Tiger Cub Totem, which is worn on the Tiger Cub belt.

WOLF

A Cub Scout who has completed first grade (or is age 8), works on 12 achievements to earn the Wolf badge.

After he earns his Wolf badge, a boy may work on electives in different interest areas until he is old enough to begin work on the Bear badge.

For every 10 electives a boy completes, he earns an *Arrow Point*. A boy may earn as many Arrow Points as he can.




BEAR

A Cub Scout who has completed second grade (or is age 9), works to complete 12 of 24 achievements to earn the Bear badge.

After he earns his Bear badge, a boy may work on electives in different interest areas until he is old enough to become a Webelos.

For every 10 electives a boy completes, he earns an *Arrow Point*. A boy may earn as many Arrow Points as he can.



WEBELOS

When a Cub Scout has completed the third grade (or becomes 10 years old), he transfers to a Webelos den. Led by an adult Webelos leader, the boy works on requirements for the Webelos badge, 20 activity badges, and the *Arrow of Light* (the highest award in Cub Scouting).

Camping and outdoor programs are an important part of the 18 month Webelos program. In the Spring of a Webelos Scout's 5th grade year, he graduates from Cub Scouting into the adventure of Boy Scouting at an impressive graduation ceremony. Every boy deserves an opportunity to be a Boy Scout.



THE ROLE OF THE COUNCIL AND THE DISTRICT

The purpose of the Boy Scouts of America is to provide a program which will aid youth in: 1) Character Development, 2) Citizenship Training, and 3) Personal Fitness (mental, physical and emotional). The purpose of the Council is to guide and support its Districts for the achievement of the movement's purpose. The Greater Niagara Frontier Council encompasses all of Erie County and the western third of Niagara.

The purpose of the District is to organize and support successful Cub Scout Packs and Boy Scout Troops by working through chartered organizations. The end result of effective District support is continued growth in membership and those members receiving a quality program.


Districts are responsible for carrying out four (4) standard functions:

1. Membership
2. Finance
3. Program
 - a. Cub Scout Activities
 - b. Scout Camping
 - c. Activities and Civic Service
 - d. Training
 - e. Advancement and Recognition
4. Unit Service

The District Committee serves as a vehicle by which Scouting programs and services are carried to the chartered organization, their units, and youth. It serves as a sounding board for the needs of chartered organizations and units. This enables the consideration of those needs as the Council program is planned. The District Committee also participates in the building and raising of the Council budget to finance the program of Scouting. Since the major role of the Council and its Districts is to extend Scouting and to provide service to all youth and adults who participate, please feel free to call upon an appropriate representative when you need help.

HOW IS SCOUTING FINANCED?

When you register your son into the Scouting program there is a \$17.00 National Registration and Insurance fee. This fee allows your son to be part of the Scouting program and goes directly to our national office to help provide many of the services that our leaders receive (training courses, *Scouting* magazine, insurance, etc.). None of this money stays in the local Council. Providing the Scouting program within the Greater Niagara Frontier Council takes an annual budget of approximately \$2.5 million; of which 88% must be raised from the generous support of friends, families, corporations and foundations. The Greater Niagara Frontier Council budget includes things; like subsidization of the summer camp program, maintenance and upkeep of the land and property at three different camping facilities, support staff, training courses for leaders, and much, much more. The funds needed to support Scouting programs in the Greater Niagara Frontier Council come from a variety of areas. Major areas of support include:

FRIENDS OF SCOUTING (FOS)

Each year the Council conducts a "Friends of Scouting" campaign to solicit contributions from families and members of the community. A personal appeal is made to parents, leaders and community members to invest in the future. When you hear "Friends of Scouting" please consider making a donation to support the local Scouting program.

POPCORN SALE

Most units in the Council participate in the annual Popcorn sale. Sales from this fundraiser benefit both the Council and those units that participate. The annual sale occurs during September and October, and popcorn is delivered in November.

SPECIAL EVENTS

Each year the Council conducts a number of special-event fundraisers to help raise money to support our Scouting program. Events include everything from a Golf Tournament to the Building Character Breakfast.

UNITED WAY

The Scouting program is not a government sponsored agency and does not receive any tax dollar support. One United Way (Niagara County) provide support of approximately 5% of the Council's annual budget.

Comparative Costs of Scouting

With a \$26 registration fee, \$25 uniform, varied Pack dues, and a \$9 book, the cost of Scouting comes to approximately \$70 per year or \$6 per month for a 12 month program. Compared to the costs of uniforms, lessons and fees for seasonal youth activities such as hockey, football, little league, basketball, and soccer, the costs of Scouting on a per month basis are hard to beat. In addition, the Family values, citizenship and leadership skills that scouting instills in youth, make it (dollar for dollar) an exceptional investment!!

SPECIAL PROGRAMS



SUMMERTIME CAMPING

Cub Scout Day Camp: An activity for all Cub Scouts that includes crafts, games, nature, sports, songs, and skits. Camps run five days in a local park.

Cub Scout Resident Camp: A three day and two night camping experience open to all Cub Scouts at Camp Barton and Tuscarora Scout Reservation. Activities include swimming, archery, nature study, sports, games, crafts and more!

PINEWOOD DERBY

Parent/son project to build a race car made from a block of wood. Boys will race their cars at the Pinewood Derby. Be there for the big race!



BLUE AND GOLD BANQUET

Our birthday party for Cub Scouting usually held at the February pack meeting.



BOYS' LIFE MAGAZINE

A monthly magazine for boys and adults. Boys' Life has interesting features on Scouting, sports, hobbies, magic, science, and U.S. history.

There are also jokes, comics, and short stories. The magazine is \$12.00/year for Scouts. There are special Tiger Cub and Cub Scout Editions.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

Scouting operates through volunteer leadership. Volunteer leaders are an example of Scouting's principle of service to others. Naturally, parents are the primary source of leaders in the Scouting program. You volunteer not only to serve Scouting, but also to help your son and his friends, and to have the chance to be a positive influence on the youth in your community.

WHAT DO YOU RECEIVE IN RETURN?

Being a leader is fun, challenging, and rewarding. Leaders find that their experiences help them to become better parents. The following are some of the many dividends that will enrich your life as you dedicate your time, talents, and enthusiasm to Scouting:

- Fun and fellowship with other families, sharing your pride in the boys' accomplishments.
- The privilege of helping to enrich and strengthen families.
- A chance to help boys learn good citizenship and to help shape them into men who have strength of character and are sensitive to the needs of others.
- The opportunity to help make a difference in the lives of boys as they grow strong in mind and body.
- A code to live by which will set a worthwhile example for both boys and adults.
- The satisfaction of being a member of a worldwide movement, and pride in being publicly identified as a part of this organization--wearing the Scouting uniform is a visible means of showing you believe in and stand up for the ideals and objectives of the Boys Scouts of America.



PACK VOLUNTEER LEADERSHIP

DEN LEADER (S)

Leads the den at weekly den and monthly pack meetings. Attends the monthly pack leaders' meeting.

CUBMASTER

Helps plan and carry out the pack program with the help of the pack committee. Emcees the monthly pack meeting and attends the pack leaders' meeting.

PACK COMMITTEE

Pack committee (positions listed below) members perform administrative functions of the pack.

COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN

Presides at all pack committee meetings. Helps recruit adult leaders. Also attends pack meetings.

SECRETARY/TREASURER

Keeps all records for the pack, including pack bank account, financial records, etc. Attends pack meeting and pack leaders' meetings.

ADVANCEMENT CHAIRMAN

Maintains advancement records for the pack. Orders and obtains all badges and insignia. Attends pack meetings and committee meetings.

SCOUTPARENT UNIT COORDINATOR

Enlists parents to help with at least one project and keeps them updated on the program and their children's involvement.

PACK TRAINER

Ensures that all leaders of the pack are trained. Attends pack meetings and committee meetings.

PARENT HELPERS

"One shot" program jobs such as coordinating pack participation in sales events, Scouting for Food, pinewood derby, blue and gold banquet, day camp, etc. These jobs are of short duration.

TRAINING

**** All leaders must complete "Youth Protection" Training, "Fast Start" Training, "This is Scouting" and "Job Specific" Training ****

Thank you so much for agreeing to be a leader in your son's Cub Scout Pack. We know you will have a great journey together and share many lifelong memories. The first step we are going to ask you to take in being a new leader is to complete training. The main purpose of training is to provide you with the tools you need to put on a quality program for the boys. Leaders who understand the *whys* and *hows* of the program are more effective in their roles and have a better understanding of how to use all available resources to provide an exciting and worthwhile program for their Scouts.

IN THE Greater Niagara Frontier COUNCIL, IT IS MANDATORY THAT ALL LEADERS COMPLETE "YOUTH PROTECTION" TRAINING, AND "JOB SPECIFIC" TRAINING BEFORE YOU REGISTER IN THE CUB SCOUT PACK. HERE IS A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF EACH TRAINING.

"YOUTH PROTECTION" TRAINING

The Boy Scouts of America places the greatest importance on creating the most secure environment possible for our youth members. This training covers the BSA's Youth Protection policies, kinds of abuse, how to respond to disclosure of abuse, and proper reporting procedures. It does so by taking you through situations that require choices and produce consequences. This training is available online and in each district throughout the year. **In order for an adult to remain a registered leader in the Boy Scouts of America, Youth Protection Training is required every two years.**

"JOB SPECIFIC" TRAINING

... is designed to present in-depth information for a new leader in a specific leadership position such as Den Leader, Cubmaster, etc. This course is presented several times a year in your district or at the council level. Be sure to ask your unit trainer for an upcoming training date or check the Council web site.

We have award winning videos for teaching Scouts and adults about child abuse protection and avoiding potentially dangerous situations.




