#### **Directions**

174<sup>th</sup> Fighter Wing, New York Air National Guard, Hancock Field Air National Guard Base 6001 East Molloy Road, Mattydale, NY 13211-7099

(Watch for "COMMISSIONER COLLEGE" directional signs from NYS Thruway Exit 35, Northern Blvd, and Route 11 just south of the Northern Lights Traffic Circle)

If you are coming from the EAST or WEST: Take the New York State Thruway (I-90) to Exit 35. After the toll plaza, enter Carrier Circle – and immediately take EXIT 1 – Thompson Road NORTH. At the SECOND traffic light on Thompson Road, turn LEFT onto Molloy Road. Entrance to the base is 1/3 mile on the RIGHT.

If you are coming from the NORTH: Take either I-81 or I-481 south to where they intersect. Then take I-481 SOUTH to the next exit – Northern Blvd. At the end of the ramp, turn RIGHT onto Northern Blvd. Follow Northern Blvd SOUTH for about 3 miles until the road bears RIGHT and becomes Molloy Road. Follow Molloy Road WEST – Entrance to the base is on the RIGHT about 1/3 mile past the second traffic light.

If you are coming from the SOUTH: Take I-81 NORTH to Exit 26 (Northern Lights/Mattydale). Follow US Route 11 SOUTH about 1/3 mile (Eckerts Drugs on LEFT. Turn LEFT onto Malden Road. Malden Road makes a 90-degree curve to the right and becomes Town Line Road. Continue to first traffic light. Turn LEFT onto MOLLOY ROAD. Entrance to the base is about 2/3 mile on the LEFT.

#### OR

Take I-81 or I-481 north to I-690. Take I-690 EAST from I-81 or WEST from I-481 to the THOMPSON ROAD NORTH exit. Follow Thompson Road NORTH to Carrier Circle – then follow EAST/WEST instructions above.

#### <u>Certificate for Commissioner Basic Training:</u> (initial formal training for Commissioners)

Awarded to attendees who complete the "Basic Training" (Course 010) curriculum.

#### Certificate for Cub Scout, Boy Scout or Venturing Roundtable Commissioner Training

Awarded to attendees who complete either "Effective Cub (030) / Scout (020)/Venturing (040) Roundtables"

#### **Bachelor of Commissioner Science:**

Awarded to attendees who complete **four** courses in the Bachelor's curriculum and **two** other courses.

#### **Master of Commissioner Science:**

Awarded to attendees who hold the Bachelor's Degree and who complete **three** courses in the Master's curriculum and **three** other courses.

#### **Doctor of Commissioner Science:**

Certificate of Doctoral Course Completion will be awarded to attendees who complete <u>four</u> courses in the Doctorate curriculum and **two** other courses.

A Doctoral Diploma will be awarded to Scouters who complete of all of the following requirements:

Hold a Certificate of Doctoral Course Completion; and

Completion of these requirements is to be certified by the Council Commissioner or, if the Council Commissioner is the candidate, by the Council President. (Council Commissioner forwards certification of completion of Doctoral requirements to College Chancellor who issues Diploma for presentation.)

#### **Certificate of Commissioner Continuing Education:**

Awarded to those Scouters who complete any <u>six</u> courses at the College. This Certificate is designed for those who have completed their Doctorates and wish to further their Scouting education, <u>or</u> to those Scouters who wish to further their Scouting education without becoming degree candidates.
